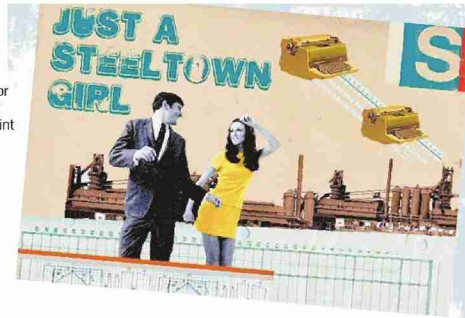

With that in mind, here are suggestions for the pop culture maven on your list.



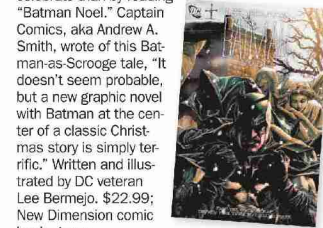

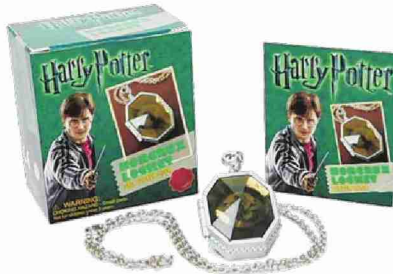
Can't get enough of the CBS comedy hit "The Big Bang Theory" and Emmy-winner Jim Parsons' Sheldon? Pop culture apparel retailer Stylin Online now has the "Soft Kitty" singing plush toy and T-shirt, sold separately and in combo. "Soft Kitty" is a ditty that Sheldon teaches to his neighbor, Penny, so she can sing it to him as his mother used to when he was sick. Press the paw, and Soft Kitty (\$29.99) will sing it to you. 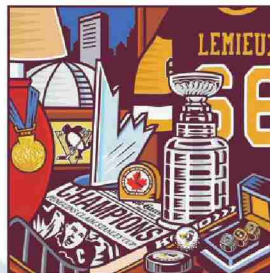


Harry Potter Slytherin's Locket Horcrux Kit and Sticker Book, \$8.95 at Barnes & Noble, is inspired by the blockbuster film "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows: Part II." This kit contains a replica of the locket that was one of Voldemort's Horcruxes and stickers highlighting the quest to destroy it. (Quick recap: A Horcrux is an object in which dark wizards and witches can hide a fragment of their souls for the purpose of attaining immortality.)

Pop culture and science fiction are a match made in the cosmos, and nowhere do they intersect more than in the "Star Trek" and "Star Wars" universes. For the fan of one, the other or both, there's the book "Star Wars vs. Star Trek: Could the Empire Kick the Federation's A**?
